OUR AUGUST GARDEN TOUR & PLANT SALE Text and Photos by Hilary Clayton

Many thanks to Debby and Steve Zweig for hosting a delightful Watnong NARGS gathering! In spite of the forecast, the weather was perfect for us, not too hot and the rain held off.

Debby and Steve purchased their home across the street from Lake Shawnee in Jefferson Township in 1996. At that time, the garden was a forest of mature trees; unfortunately, 16 hemlocks were lost to the wooly adelgid. Shade gardens were a natural fit, with the goal providing food and shelter to attract wildlife. Many desirable native plants were already on site- maple leaf viburnums, witch-hazel, choke cherry and mayapple; to these Debby added a broad selection of mostly native flowering perennials and ferns to create very natural looking beds and borders.

Over the years, neighbors have removed mature trees, adding sunlight and new planting opportunities. plants, Meadow type such as Veronicastrum 'Fascination', Eupatorium dubium 'Baby Joe', and Verbesina alternifolia, wingstem, were added, and attract many pollinators. A fence nearby supports a beautiful and much-admired variegated climbing Hydrangea, Hydrangea anomala spp petiolaris 'Firefly', as well as the native Virginia creeper, Parthenocissus quinquefolia.

In 2019, inspired by her volunteer work with the Watnong NARGS project at the Laurelwood Arboretum, Debby began a rock garden of her own, featuring *Chamaecyparis obtusa* 'Hage'; dwarf *Hosta* 'You're So Vein', 'Mouse Ear', and 'Twist of Lime', and the spreaders *Campanula poscharskyana* 'Camgood', *Isotoma fluviatilis*, the blue star creeper, and *Callirhoe involucrata*. In addition there are spring blooming *Aquilegia* 'Corbett', *Iberis sempervirens*, candytuft, and as a work in progress, surely more to come.

Debby's newest addition, some vegetable planters, came in response to her neighbors' tree removals last winter. These attracted a lot of admiration- not just for the gorgeous tomatoes, but for her clever use of Krylon Coarse Stone Texture Finish Spray Paint, which makes the large plastic containers look like huge troughs. (She bought it at Home Depot but suspects it's available whenever Krylon paint is sold.)

In addition to being a long -needed opportunity to see each other again, the plant sale raised \$393, with zero expenses. Thanks again to Debby and Steve for making the day possible!
