
Denver Gardens and rocky mountain wildflowers

Denver, the capital of Colorado, is an American metropolis dating to the Old West era. Larimer Square, the city's oldest block, features landmark 19thcentury buildings. Museums include the Denver Art Museum, known for its collection of indigenous works, and the mansion of famed Titanic survivor Molly Brown. Denver marks the transition between the prairies and the Rocky Mountains. With a rich gardening tradition and a diverse native flora, this tour offers diverse opportunities to enjoy both nature and culture.



He has designed plantings for many of the gardens at DBG and is particularly noted for the plantings of the Rock Alpine Garden.

Panayoti has introduced hundreds of native ornamentals from throughout the Western United States to general horticulture. He has collected plants throughout both hemispheres, and his plant introductions are available through Plant Select®, (a plant introduction program he helped launch along with staff from Colorado State University and nurseries across America). He has lectured in twelve countries and has been featured in dozens of television, newspaper and magazine pieces.



WELCOME TO DENVER

Join Garden and Nature Tours with C. Colston Burrell, The Minnesota State Horticultural Society, The North American Rock Garden Society and Friendship Tours in The Mile High City of Denver, the capital of Colorado. Poised at the foot of the Front Range, Denver's gardens reflect the tension between plains and mountains, with elements as diverse as sweeping prairies, colorful perennial beds, cottage gardens, dwarf conifer collections and intricate rock and alpine gardens.

Our tour takes us to private and public gardens throughout the metro area, including the world-famous Denver Botanic Gardens, as well as private gardens including those of well-known American horticulturists Panayoti Kelaidis, Rob Proctor, Marcia Tatroe and Lauren Springer. We will also explore an innovative urban greening project designed to provide useable open space while managing stormwater.

Our hotel for five nights is in LoDo (Lower Downtown), a neighborhood that offers the perfect blend of nostalgia and modernity. LoDo is home to nearly 100 restaurants, clubs, galleries, shops and hospitality businesses, making it the perfect place to explore for residents and tourists alike. LoDo's rich history dates to 1858 when gold was discovered at the confluence of the South Platte River and Cherry Creek. Since then, the area has undergone a major revitalization, becoming a key link between Denver's past and present.

The gardens we visit on our tour are located within the city limits as well as all around the greater metro area. South of Denver, we visit a variety of private gardens in Colorado Springs and Castle Pines. We also spend a day visiting gardens in Pueblo and Colorado Springs.

After touring 14 gardens in the metro area, we head north to visit gardens in Boulder and on to Fort Collins for two nights. The Old Town historic district has 1800s houses, a vintage trolley, specialty shops and restaurants. Here we visit both private and public gardens, including The Gardens on Spring Creek, a city-owned botanical garden offering a diversity of native and site-adapted plants and a wealth of garden styles.

I hope that you will join me for an immersive exploration of Denver gardens, history and culture at the foot of the Rocky Mountains.

DAY 1 - Tuesday, June 13

Arrival Day

Today, depart your home cities for Denver International, a stunning, modern airport set on the rolling prairie northeast of downtown Denver. Lunch is on your own, so grab a bite at the airport, or wait to have a snack at the hotel. Plan to arrive in Denver no later than noon. Once we are all collected, we board the coach for our hotel, The Hilton Garden Inn Union Station, in the bustling LoDo neighborhood. There is time to check in before we visit Quince Garden, the home of internationally renowned horticulturist and plantsman **Panayoti Kelaidis**. He and his partner Jan Fahs will welcome us for a tour, reception and dinner.

Panayoti has gardened on a knoll with the best mountain view in Denver for many years. He and Jan have shoehorned a surprising number of very different gardens into this intensively cultivated half acre, including a vegetable garden, woodland gardens, a number of perennial borders, crevice and rock gardens, pond, bog, a small prairie, extensive xeric wild gardens and even a bit of lawn and a nursery! Where else will you see over 100 species each of ferns, cacti and South African succulents all in the same garden? And then there are the hundreds of pots and troughs.

After our tour and dinner, we return to our hotel for five nights. Night at Hilton Garden Inn Union Station. D



DAY 2 - Wednesday, June 14 Denver Botanic Garden

Today, after our included breakfast, we set out to visit **Denver Botanic Gardens** (DBG) with host Panayoti Kelaidis. The 23-acre garden contains a conservatory, a variety of themed gardens and a sunken amphitheater. It features North America's largest collection of plants from cold temperate climates around the world, as well as seven diverse gardens that mostly include plants from Colorado and neighboring states. The world's first Xeriscape Demonstration Garden was created at the Gardens in 1986. DBG also boasts the first conservatory in America that was made entirely of concrete and plexiglass panes. At the conclusion of our tour, enjoy lunch in the Gardens' cafe.

Next, we depart DBG to visit the **Molly Brown House Museum**. The house stands as an enduring symbol of the turn of the 20th century in Denver. The museum features memorabilia from the life of philanthropist and Titanic survivor Elizabeth "Molly" Brown.

The vision for **SummerHome Garden**, our next stop, was pioneered by Lisa Negri, a community leader in the Washington Park neighborhood and a lifelong resident of the city. Lisa bought the uninhabitable vacant home next to hers and collapsed it into its basement, creating a safe, inspirational, and horticulturally progressive pocket park for the community to enjoy. The plantings, designed by Kevin Philip Williams and Sonya Anderson, are modeled on the ephemerality of graffiti and celebrate the complexity and immersive-nature of southwestern shrublands.

Our final stop today is for a visit with **Dan Johnson**, Curator of Native Plants and Associate Director of Horticulture at the Denver Botanic Gardens. His garden delights visitors with xeric and native plants, cacti and succulents, conifers, annuals, perennials, temperate trees and shrubs, tropicals from the traditional to the rare, and up-cycled artifacts "just for fun."

After our tour, we return to our hotel. Dinner is on your own. Night at Hilton Garden Inn Union Station. B, L



DAY 3 - Thursday, June 15 Private Gardens at Elevation

Today, after our included breakfast, we visit with **Keith and Retha Funk.** Their **Pine Garden** is a collector's paradise with no preplanned design. They removed the lawn in favor of interconnected gardens including a hot, sunny rock garden, water feature, flagstone patio surrounded by shade gardens and perennial beds dotted with dwarf conifers. The back garden feels like an English walled garden with perennial beds surrounding a patio embellished with large potted tropicals and colorful annuals.

The eight compact gardens of **Glen Gutenberg and Patrice Van Vleet Garden** surround their mountain home at an elevation of 6,300 feet. The local red rock formations set the tone for the eclectic, semi-wild style that has evolved over 30 years. The gardens are tucked into groves of Gambel oak with a backdrop of towering Douglas fir and sandstone cliffs. Over time, the plant pallet has shifted toward alpine and cold-hardy desert plants that survive erratic temperature swings and extended droughts.

Next, we visit **Bob and Shari Jondle** for a box lunch and tour in their spectacular garden nestled in the rolling hills at an elevation of 6,500 feet. Paths throughout the sloping, oneacre property lead to sitting areas with spectacular views of Pikes Peak and Mount Evans. Water features add sound and movement to the surroundings. Plantings chosen to coexist with deer and other wildlife blend seamlessly into the native landscape beyond.

Author/photographer team **Marcia and Randy Tatroe** have been gardening on a small suburban lot in Centennial since 1987. Their collector's garden with hundreds of native plants has been featured in numerous books, magazines and garden programs. Their organic wildlife-friendly garden is designated a Xerces Society pollinator habitat, a wildlife habitat by National Wildlife Federation, and as Habitat Hero status from Audubon Rockies.

After our tour, we return to the hotel. Dinner is on your own. Night at Hilton Garden Inn Union Station. B, L



DAY 4 - Friday, June 16

Pueblo and Colorado Spring with Panayoti

Today, after our included breakfast, we set out to visit **Bobby Valentine** in his ever-changing garden built from the ground up on a once-overgrown site. Inspired by years living in Tucson, Arizona, this xeric garden is built with dedication and imagination, a collection of Agave, Yucca and myriad cacti create a sculptural backdrop for a series of terraces.

Our next stop is for a tour and box lunch with **Andrew and Michelle Conrad**. Their spectacular two-acre garden sits atop the bluffs along the southern bank of the Arkansas river near Pueblo. The garden consists of natural wetlands and prairie mixed with xeriscaped areas and English gardens. Both native and non-native species are represented along with abundant wildlife.

Jeff Ottersberg gardens out in the public eye. His rock garden fills the entire front of his halfacre lot, and his Wild Things nursery covers the back. The garden features cold and drought tolerant cactus such as *Echinocerus* and *Opuntia*, and succulents Agave, Yucca, Hesperaloe and Nolina, admired for their flowers and summer effect. Perennials include Hymenoxis, Callilophus, penstemon and verbena.

Our last stop of the day is for an amazing tour of **Domenique Turnbull**'s personal alpine and rock garden, on which he has been working for over 20 years. Domenique has designed alpine troughs for the Denver Botanic Gardens and Betty Ford Alpine Gardens (where he also helped install their rock garden). A gifted artist using the medium of stone and plants, his reputation has spread across Colorado and beyond.

After our tour, we return to our hotel. Dinner is on your own. Night at Hilton Garden Inn Union Station. B, L



DAY 5 - Saturday, June 17 Private Gardens Denver

Today, after our included breakfast, we set out to visit the gardens of two exceptional Denver plantsmen — Kelly Grummons and Rob Proctor. **Kelly Grummons'** three-quarteracre garden is an ongoing experiment with growing native plant species and especially cultivars. Most plants in the garden were tested for the Plant Select Program. Many are ongoing candidates for introductions. His goal over the 30 years in this garden has been to show gardeners that the low-water garden can be beautiful throughout the year. The garden has a backbone of native yuccas, agaves, cacti, conifers, grasses and wildflowers.

TV host **Rob Proctor** and his partner **David Macke**'s roomy city garden is planted from lot line to lot line. Starting as a nearly-blank canvas of lawn and trash trees 25 years ago, this garden is a series of perennial borders, garden rooms and intimate spaces. It also features extensive pollinator-friendly xeriscapes, shade gardens, a European-style parterre and vegetable garden. Six hundred containers feature tropicals and annuals. The 1905 Italianate house will also be open.

After visiting with these powerhouse gardeners, we enjoy lunch at **Patzcuaro's**, noted for award-winning authentic Mexican fare.

After lunch, we take a tour of the **39TH Avenue Greenway**, an innovative urban greening and stormwater management project. The Greenway is a flood-control mechanism and public park, one in a suite of projects referred to as the Platte to Park Hill stormwater plan intended to reduce flooding in the area. Amenities include picnic areas accented with native shrubs, wildflowers and grasses.

After our tour, in mid-afternoon we return to our hotel. Dinner is on your own. Night at Hilton Garden Inn Union Station. B, L



DAY 6 - Sunday, June 18

Boulder to Fort Collins

After our included breakfast, we check out and depart for the drive to Boulder, and then on to Fort Collins.

Our first stop is **Harlequin's Garden** for a tour and boxed lunch. Owners Mikl Brawner and Eve Reshetnik Brawner specialize in Colorado-adapted plants, hardy own-root roses, xeriscape plants, natives, perennials, shrubs, herbs, rock garden plants and fruit trees. They have been testing these plants since 1985 at their exposed and dry North Boulder location and we will tour the nursery and the demonstration gardens, which are both organic.

After an early lunch we continue on to **High Plains Environmental Center** to meet Executive Director Jim Tolstrup. The Center's mission is to educate communities to become replicable "living laboratories" that demonstrate restorative examples of land-stewardship, native plants and wildlife habitat. The center features prairie and wetland demonstration gardens, medicinal plants, heirloom fruits and a native plant nursery.

After our tour, we head to Fort Collins to check into our hotel for two nights. The afternoon is at leisure. Dinner is on your own. Night in Fort Collins at The Hilton Fort Collins. B, L



DAY 7 - Monday, June 19

Fort Collins

After our included breakfast, we begin our day of garden visits with **Carol Shinn**, where rock gardens, sunny perennial beds, xeric and native beds, roses, vegetables, and shade areas all blend beautifully on her one-third-acre lot. Her rock gardens display a diversity of construction styles using three different rock types. Two water features compliment the diverse plantings in the garden, which provide a year round refuge for birds and pollinators.

Our next stop is the garden of **Herb and Cindy Schaal**, a one-acre wonderland they have tended for the past 30 years. Nestled spaces and strong indoor/outdoor relationships characterize this cottage style home and garden featuring a mix of ornamental and edible species. Plant selections stress Colorado natives and other species that are site adapted and deer resistant. The garden provides excellent habitat for birds and other wildlife.

Lunch is at Howling Cow Café and Market, located at Morning Fresh Dairy Farm.

The 18-acre **Gardens on Spring Creek** is the community botanic garden of Fort Collins. It reflects an important partnership between the City of Fort Collins and the Friends of the Gardens on Spring Creek. The carefully curated gardens provide an escape for healing, rest, retreat, and a place to experience the beauty of nature. Individual gardens of interest include the Undaunted Garden, Rock Garden, Prairie Garden, Foothills Garden, vegetable gardens, and themed and sustainable demonstration gardens. We have special guided tours with **Bryan Fischer**, designer of the Prairie Garden, and author **Lauren Springer**, designer of the Undaunted Garden.

After our tour, we return to the hotel to freshen up before gathering for our farewell dinner at **Blue Agave Grill**. Night in Fort Collins at The Hilton Fort Collins. B, L, D



DAY 8 - Tuesday, June 20

Fort Collins to Denver International

After our included breakfast, we check out of the hotel and say farewell to those heading for the Denver International airport and on to home. It is an hour-and-a-half drive to the airport. Please do not schedule your return flight before noon.


Those joining the extension will board our coach for a scenic three-and-a-half-hour drive through prairies and mountain passes to Steamboat Springs.



Denver Gardens




Denver and Fort Collins Maps

Touring on High

Our Tour Extension focuses on gardens and natural areas around the mountain resort towns of Steamboat Springs and Vail. Steamboat Springs lies within Yampa Valley at 6,732 feet elevation. The town is surrounded by lofty peaks and alpine meadows awash with wildflowers. It's home to ski resorts and geothermal hot springs.

Vail Village sits at 8,150 feet elevation at the base of Vail Mountain, home of the massive Vail Ski Resort. Set within White River National Forest, the town is a gateway for winter sports and a colorful garden village in summer. It's also a favorite destination for golfing, hiking and cultural festivals. The surrounding mountains shelter a wealth of alpine plants.

We will be crossing mountain passes and taking easy to moderately-strenuous wildflower walks at elevations ranging from 6,000 to 8,000 feet. Rabbit Ears Pass is 9,426 feet, and Vail Mountain is 11,570 feet. The gardens on this tour are also at elevation. If you have experienced altitude sickness in the past, please consult your doctor. You may want to take a diuretic to alleviate any possible symptoms.

Meet Your Field Trip Guide

Mike Kintgen is a Senior Horticulturist at the Denver Botanic Gardens where he oversees the Alpine Collection and nine gardens including the Rock Alpine Garden and South African Plaza. Mike has worked full time at DBG since late 2004, but has volunteered and helped out since the mid-1990s. In 2012 he finished a two-year project to get DBG's collection of alpines recognized in the North American Plant Collection Consortium through the American Public Gardens Association. He interned at both at Chicago Botanic Gardens and at the Rhododendron Species Foundation under Steve Hootman. He has been a member of North American Rock Garden Society (NARGS) since 1993 (age 12) and is currently president of the Rocky Mountain Chapter of NARGS. Traveling since a young age has allowed him to observe alpines in Alaska, Hawaii, Argentina, Morocco, Spain, the Alps and throughout the American West.

DAY 8 - Tuesday, June 20 Fort Collins to Steamboat Springs


After our included breakfast, we check out and begin our scenic three-and-a-half-hour journey to Steamboat Springs. Our route takes us north through Laramie, Wyoming, giving you a chance to add a new state to your list! We traverse open prairie before climbing into the mountains along beautiful Grizzly Creek. We stop for a box lunch at **Dumont Lake Campground**. Here we meet **Mike Kintgen**, our guide for an afternoon wildflower excursion. Dumont Lake is a high elevation lake on top of **Rabbit Ears Pass**.

Mike will take us on a walk to enjoy the many wildflowers in the vicinity of the lake and the pass. Depending on altitude and snow melt, we may see fields of *Erythronium grandiflorum* or early season wildflowers such as lupines, white gillia, Nuttlal's larkspur and Nuttall's phlox. We will explore short trails that allow access to both meadow and woodland wildflowers.

After our walk, we head into Steamboat Springs to check into our hotel. Dinner is on your own. Night in Steamboat Springs at Nordic Lodge. B, L

DAY 9 - Wednesday, June 21 Steamboat Springs

This morning, enjoy breakfast on your own before we visit **Mike Kintgen's Garden**. Mike started the garden in 1988 when he was seven years old. It has grown into a diverse collection of plants that thrive at 8,150 feet and provide a long season of interest. Fueled by his passion for travel and work at Denver Botanic Garden, conifers, Rocky Mountain natives, alpines and rock garden plants from around the world mingle in beds and rockeries. Collections of Saxifraga, Androsace, Salix, and Penstemon are highlights. Cold tolerant palms, agaves and other succulents add a touch of the unexpected.

Our next stop is **Yampa River Botanic Park**, a six-acre botanical garden that was transformed from a horse pasture along the Yampa River and opened to the public in 1997. There are 63 individual gardens with different themes, designs and types of plant collections, all nestled below a canopy of 500 trees. Native and high-altitude plants from around the world thrive in the Zone 4 gardens. There are 19 pieces of sculpture and sweeping views of Emerald Mountain. After our tour, enjoy a catered lunch in the garden.

Next we visit with **Lisa Godbolt**, who grows cut flowers on a hillside where perennial gardens and lush beds envelope the house. Tucked under trees and in the shade of the house, hellebores, bleeding hearts, *Lewisia* and *Astrantia* thrive. A small greenhouse for vegetables, and an herb garden provide food and flavor.

Next, **Karen Vail** welcomes us to her tiny garden full of surprises! From an empty pasture 27 years ago, the garden is now full of life. It includes rockeries of alpine and desert plants, xeric gardens with native and native adapted plants, troughs with wee treasures, veggies, an orchard, and natural areas for wildlife. Based on permaculture concepts and gardening for pollinators and wildlife, the garden is vibrant, diverse and creative.

After our garden visits, we return to the hotel. Dinner is on your own. Night in Steamboat Springs, Nordic Lodge. L



DAY 10 - Thursday, June 22 Steamboat or Vail

After breakfast on your own, we check out and join **Mike Kintgen** for another scenic wildflower walk. **Stillwater Reservoir Road** leads through national forest land to the headwaters of the Yampa River in the scenic flattops south of Steamboat. Along this winding road we will make several stops to enjoy the views. Wildflowers include Colorado columbine, penstemons, Indian paint brushes, mules ears (Wyethia), blue flax and buckwheat (Eriogonum). Mountain bluebird, Townsend's solitaire, and are a few of the birds we might encounter. We may even see some bighorn sheep.

After our wildflower excursion, we stop for lunch at **Antler's Café** in Yampa. Noted for excellent chef-prepared food, this hidden gem of a restaurant offers rustic Western ambiance and great food and drink.

After our tour, we head south to Vail to check into our hotel. Dinner is on your own. Night in Vail at Tivoli Lodge. L



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DAY 11 - Friday, June 23 Vail

After our included breakfast, we head to **Betty Ford Alpine Gardens** for a guided tour with Nick Courtens. The garden was founded in 1985 by the Vail Alpine Garden Foundation and named in 1988 in honor of former First Lady Betty Ford. The Gardens is an internationally acclaimed collection of alpine plants in the Rocky Mountains known for its alpine horticulture, education and conservation. Betty Ford Alpine Gardens, at 8,200 feet, is the highest elevation botanical garden in North America. The Gardens attracts more than 120,000 visitors annually to see its unique display of alpine and mountain plants collected from around the world. The entire plant collection showcases more than 3,000 species of high-altitude plants, many of which are from the Rocky Mountains, as well as some from other regions of the world.

After visiting the gardens, we begin an hour-long walking tour **Hort and Art - A Great Pair** to see the amazing public art installations in the Village, and learn what it takes to design and plant seasonal color! We end our tour with pre-ordered lunch from **Big Bear Bistro**. After lunch relax in town or board the gondola for a scenic ride to the top of **Vail Mountain**. Early season alpine wildflowers abound as we walk the one mile trail to Lionshead. We catch the gondola down, board our coach and return to our hotel to freshen up.


This evening, to bring our tour to a close, enjoy a farewell reception and dinner at a local restaurant. Night at Tivoli Lodge. B, L, D
